# What We Do

Each of the six color blocks of the First Steps logo represents a core area of service, outlining our comprehensive strategy to prepare children for long-term school success.

With **measurable outcomes across each of its six school readiness strategy areas**, First Steps is getting results.



## Healthy Start

We begin with a focus on providing a healthy start to life. This includes prenatal and post-partum services for both mother and baby. In 2007, First Steps collaborated with key philanthropic and agency partners to bring Nurse-Family Partnership to SC having a significant impact on reducing premature births and Medicaid costs.



## Quality Childcare

Quality childcare starts with quality childcare providers. Our quality enhancement and training strategies lead to improved teacher-student interaction, which research shows has a significant impact on a child's development and success in school.



## Family Strengthening

Our home visitation strategies, such as Parents as Teachers, Parent-Child Home and Early Steps to School Success, are helping parents understand their responsibilities to care for and be positive models for their children. As a result of First Steps' intervention and parenting support, 66% of clients initially assessed at "low" levels of parenting have achieved moderate or high levels of parenting skill.



## Early Education

Private-public partnerships through First Steps 4K have led to significant cost efficiencies in the delivery of publicly funded 4K. One recent analysis suggests First Steps is achieving comparable results, without the need for costly capital construction, for 80 cents on the dollar. Early Head Start expands quality early learning and family support to infants and toddlers.



## Early Intervention

Children's school readiness depends on their healthy growth and development. First Steps helps identify potential delays early through developmental screenings and referring children to BabyNet and other early intervention resources.



## School Transition

Each of the corresponding blocks of services leads ultimately to the goal of transitioning children successfully to school. Programs like Countdown to Kindergarten are ultimately preparing children for school success.

**Based on the needs of our community, Edgefield County First Steps focuses its investments in healthy start, family strengthening, quality childcare, and school transition strategy areas.**

# Nurse-Family Partnership

**Helping vulnerable first-time mothers empowers them to achieve a better life for themselves and their children.**

## Program Description

Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP) helps transform the lives of vulnerable first-time mothers and their babies. Through ongoing home visits from registered nurses, low-income, first-time moms receive the care and support they need to have a healthy pregnancy, provide responsible and competent care for their children, and become more economically self-sufficient. From pregnancy until the child turns two years old, Nurse-Family Partnership Nurse Home Visitors form a much-needed, trusting relationship with the first-time moms, instilling confidence and empowering them to achieve a better life for their children – and themselves.



In Edgefield County, Nurse-Family Partnership is implemented through Carolina Health Centers, Inc.



## Program Description

Family literacy programs offer an integrated and family-friendly approach, helping both parents and children to improve their literacy skills. Family literacy services integrate all of the following:

1. Adult Education
2. Child Education
3. Parent Education
4. Interactive Parent/Child Activities

Our family literacy program:

- ✓ **Helps parents of young children increase their education levels**
- ✓ **Teaches parents how to support their child's literacy and overall development**
- ✓ **Provides quality early learning experiences for children 0-5 while their parents attend adult education**



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# Imagination Library



**Children’s reading scores improve dramatically when parents are involved in helping them learn to read.**

## Program Description

According to the Center on the Developing Child at Harvard University, the peak period for brain development related to language is around **nine months of age. One of the easiest and most effective ways to build this capacity in young children’s brains is to read to them.**

Edgefield County First Steps is the local sponsor of Dolly Parton Imagination Library, which provides free, age-appropriate books to children age birth to 5 years. Operated by the Dollywood Foundation, Imagination Library is currently in more than 1,600 communities internationally and mails books to about 700,000 children each month.

Children who register with Edgefield County First Steps receive one book per month by mail through the month of their fifth birthday. Each book is carefully selected by a committee of educational specialists.

**This year, our Imagination Library program:**

- ✓ Provided one book per month to 191 children who were referred from state and local organizations
- ✓ Pre-survey results indicate that 52% of the children enrolled have fewer than 10 books in their home
- ✓ Post-survey results indicate that 43% of families enrolled increased the amount of time they spent reading to their child
- ✓ Was completely funded by private donations from more than 50 community members and organizations in support of children’s literacy

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# Child Care Quality Enhancement

In order to thrive, children need nurturing, responsive relationships and a supportive learning environment, both within and outside the home.

## Program Description

The quality of care they received by young children is crucial to their healthy development and school readiness. Child care providers strive to provide high quality care, but may lack the resources that are commonly available to publicly-funded early childhood programs, such as educational materials, on-site professional development, and other support.

**First Steps' Child Care Quality Enhancement (QE) is intended to produce measurable improvements in the quality of care provided to young children.** Participating child care providers must serve a high percentage of at-risk children, and are selected through a competitive process that requires a strong level of commitment to the QE process.

### Program Components

1. On-site Technical Assistance (TA) at least twice monthly
2. Equipment and materials funding
3. Integration with locally available training, provided by First Steps and other partners
4. Workforce Development
5. Coordination with community partners
6. Pre/post assessments of the classroom environment and teacher-child interaction, using nationally-recognized observational tools for infant/toddler and preschool settings (ITERS-R, ECERS-3)

The scores reflected in the chart above show improvement from the pre-assessments done in the fall of 2016 to the post assessments done in the spring of 2017. Scores can range from a 1.0 (which is inadequate), to a 7.0 (which is excellent).

## This year, our Quality Enhancement program:

- ✓ Improved quality, on average, by .64 based on pre/post Environment Rating Scale assessments
- ✓ Provided 30.75 hours of technical assistance to child care providers
- ✓ Provided \$ 4,000 in materials grants to participating child care providers
- ✓ Funded scholarships for 30 children within participating child care providers

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# Child Care Scholarships

Too many families in Edgefield County cannot afford quality care for their children.

## Program Description

Access to quality child care is essential for children while away from their primary caregivers. Yet, of those families income-eligible for child care assistance in South Carolina, only a small fraction receive it due to lack of funds. In the absence of nurturing and consistently available family, friends or neighbors, parents are faced with few - or no - affordable care options.

Edgefield County First Steps serves families in greatest need. Among our scholarship families:

- 84% ... live in poverty
- 72% ... were single parent households
- 16% ... included parental/caregiver depression
- 12% ... were teen parents

In addition to regular monitoring of child care providers that receive First Steps scholarships, First Steps conducts at least two developmental screenings each year with scholarship children and connects families to needed services within the community.

Child care scholarship families are also referred to the Triple P strategy for parenting workshops.

### This year, our Scholarship program:

- ✓ Provided 30 children with scholarship assistance so their parents could work or attend school
- ✓ Identified and addressed 22 potential developmental delays among scholarship children
- ✓ Made 20 connections for families to services such as BabyNet and Triple P
- ✓ Supported 1 small business in Edgefield County by subsidizing child care tuition for families who would not otherwise be able to afford quality care
- ✓ Provided 30 hours of training for scholarship parents with topics such as positive parenting, helping children develop, managing misbehavior, planning ahead, and using positive parenting strategies.

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**Bringing parents and teachers together as partners sets the foundation for success in school.**

## Program Description

Countdown to Kindergarten (CTK) is a summer home visitation model connecting rising kindergartners and their families with their future teachers. The program is designed:

- ✓ to forge strong and lasting home-school relationships,
- ✓ to acquaint children and families with the state and classroom expectations to increase the likelihood of school success,
- ✓ to increase parent involvement in the early grades (particularly in hard-to-reach communities), when children's learning is foundational for life success; and
- ✓ to increase public awareness of the importance of school readiness and provide ways for parents and communities to impact children's early school success.

Countdown to Kindergarten integrates all of the following:

**Home Visitation.** Teachers make six visits over the summer to the homes of participating students and families. Children and families are introduced to actual materials used in kindergarten and are given a Kindergarten Transition Toolkit to keep.


**Learning Celebration.** The last visit is a "field trip" to the school where the child will attend class in the fall.

**Public Awareness.** Throughout the summer, First Steps releases tips to media to help parents and caregivers get children ready for kindergarten.

- ✓ There was a 100% gain in parents' knowledge of kindergarten expectations to the "good" or "very detailed" level of understanding.
- ✓ According to kindergarten teachers, 100% of CTK children performed as well as, or better than, their fellow students during the 2016-17 school year.



## Perseverance Prevails – A Family Literacy Success Story

The 2016-2017 Edgefield County Family Literacy Program was very successful in producing five graduates, which included two high school diploma recipients and three GED recipients. All of the graduates were successful in accomplishing their individual goals and one student's success was particularly outstanding.

Crystal Ivey has shown great determination in completing her education. Nine years ago, Crystal enrolled in the Edgefield County Adult Education Program in pursuit of her GED. During those years, Crystal became a single mother of two children. Crystal participated in the GED online program, evening literacy, Career Readiness/WorkKeys and GED /HSD preparation. Crystal earned a Bronze Career Readiness WorkKeys Certificate.

There was a period prior to completing her GED credentials when Crystal was inactive. In December 2016, Crystal was determined to finish her education so she could pursue college. She enrolled in the Edgefield County Adult Education program where she attended the Fox Creek location evening classes. Crystal soon realized she needed extra support; therefore, she transferred to the Johnston Learning Center location to enroll in the family literacy program. Crystal has a 2 year old son and needed childcare. Fortunately, the Edgefield County Family Literacy program was able to meet Crystal's needs. In assessing Crystal's Life Skills Progression, Crystal made the greatest progression gain. In reviewing the TABE (Test for Adult Basic Education) scores, Crystal advanced six grade levels during this school year, which is a testament of her hard work and determination. Crystal's scores were well above the other family literacy participants enrolled in the program. Crystal maintained all of her scheduled home visits. While participating, Crystal faced several obstacles but she did not let those obstacles stop her. The Adult Education and Family Literacy staff continued to motivate and encourage Crystal, as they do all of the students enrolled in the programs.

In May of 2017, Crystal Ivey successfully completed her GED credential. She decided to retake the Career Readiness WorkKeys assessment and scored a silver certificate this time. Crystal's daughter advanced to the 2<sup>nd</sup> grade and her son will be attending Head Start this year. Last but not least, Crystal enrolled in Aiken Technical College to pursue a career as a pharmacy technician.

## Community Members as Leaders for Early Childhood Education

The Edgefield County First Steps Partnership Board Board consists of members representing our county's education, health, business, faith, social service, and civic communities. These individuals are dedicated to the purpose of ensuring that all our children reach first grade ready to learn and succeed.
