

This was a rewarding year for the families we served in Cherokee County. Family engagement and outreach were vital components to our plan. We focused on contact with families as well as the public by participating in 77 outreach events, meetings, presentations, education fairs and health fairs. The connections and subsequent interactions allowed staff to serve 9,220 children and adults.

There were 20,544 books distributed to 2,160 children through Dolly Parton's Imagination Library Program; Triple P held 245 parenting sessions; LENA/Talk to Me provided 181 parent visits; childcare providers received 20 hours of certified training; and 98 home visits were delivered through Countdown to Kindergarten to families. I express my sincere gratitude to all board members, partners, staff, and families for the important parts you played this year.

We look forward to you joining us next year to assist in preparing the children of Cherokee County for more great success!

Serving Cherokee County's children birth through age five.

We received placement of my partner's three young children. The children came from a challenging background, and there were neglect issues. Our boys were two and three years old and could only speak about five words each. They communicated through grunting and crying. Our little girl was having to repeat Kindergarten. After we participated in Talk to Me, the boys had whole conversations. It was such a blessing to be able to explain situations to all three children and get feedback from them. It also allowed me to be more capable as I do not have to guess their needs. Participation in Triple P has also been beneficial as it gave us multiple disciplinary options with the children. As each child has a very different attitude, it gave us the tools needed to figure out what works best for each one. We understand each other better and are more cohesive as a family. We are truly grateful for the changes that have been made due to our participation in the programs.




