

Laurens County First Steps has had a remarkable year, characterized by significant progress in our mission to empower parents and caregivers to effectively serve as their child's first teacher, thereby increasing their potential to succeed in school and beyond. Through collaborative partnerships, innovative programs, and a steadfast commitment to early childhood development, we have continued to create a lasting impact in our community.

Program Achievements: This year, Laurens County First Steps served over 1,100 families, providing critical resources and support through home visits, parent education, and early learning initiatives. Our implementation of the Dolly Parton Imagination Library for children zoned for Laurens County School District 56 provided 405 children with books to help to prepare them for academic success. LCFS provided STEAM education programming to 723 children through our childcare providers and child development centers. We are thrilled to bring STEAM back to the classrooms this year for our 3, 4, and 5-year-olds.

Partnerships: We expanded our partnerships with all childcare providers, local schools, healthcare providers, and community organizations, fostering a robust network that allowed us to better address the diverse needs of families. By working together, we can increase access to early childhood education and family support services.

Looking Ahead: As we move forward, Laurens County First Steps remains committed to building on this year's successes. We will continue to adapt and innovate, ensuring that every child in Laurens County can thrive, both in school and in life.

In addition, LCFS, in partnership with the Joe Adair Outdoor Education Center, installed the first ever StoryWalk® Trail. A StoryWalk® Trail is a fun, educational activity that places the pages from a children's story along a trail in a community. It is for children of all levels to enjoy the outdoors and read a book with their family and friends. A StoryWalk® Trail helps build children's interest in reading while encouraging healthy outdoor physical fitness. Local schools, and even childcare providers, can also use this trail for educational and physical fitness purposes.

Partnerships remain at the core of our success. Our collaborations with local stakeholders have allowed us to leverage resources, expand our reach, and address the diverse needs of our community. Whether through our work with local childcare providers, community health agencies, or the many volunteers who lend their time and talents, we have seen the powerful results that come from working together with a shared vision.

Looking ahead, we remain committed to building on this year's successes. We recognize the challenges that still lie ahead—particularly in closing opportunity gaps for our most vulnerable children—but we are confident that through continued collaboration, innovation, and investment in early childhood education, we will rise to meet these challenges. 


