October 2022 - March 2023


PRIORITIZE

Priorities: Summary

1. Child Care deserts

Focus group participants expressed the need for both more child care centers and better quality among those that exist. Subordinate to this was the shortage of personnel in early childcare, the lack of facilities, and the availability of childcare in rural areas. Also included here would be afterschool care and infant- toddler care

2. Affordable Housing

Berkeley County has the lowest median household income in the Tri-County region, resulting in residents paying a higher percentage of their incomes for housing. Rental rates are increasing faster than median household income, resulting in a decline in affordability.

3. Transportation

Once rural and agricultural in nature, Berkeley County is now one of the fastest growing regions in the nation with a booming employment opportunities. We've exceeded the threshold for needing a commuter-oriented transit system that can increase access for all residents, especially low-income families to jobs, health care and other services.

47% of Berkeley County is a child care desert





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Priority Two: Affordable Housing

45% of Berkeley County renters are paying more than 30% of their household income towards housing.

The median rent in Berkeley County is \$1,109. Census tracts that are close to Charleston County have a much higher median rent than those located in the northern rural areas which are home to a large Black population with lower household income.
