October 2022 - March 2023




Organized the insight gathered from the convenings and data to prioritize the concerns, needs, and gaps the partnership wants to address and formalized Needs Assessment

59.6% of children in Colleton County have experienced at least one adverse childhood consequence



Priority One: Child Care Deserts

63% of children in Colleton County live in or near a child care desert in our community




Priority Two: Parenting Programs

59.6% of children in Colleton County have experienced at least one adverse childhood consequence

According to the Kids Count Data Center, research indicates that adverse childhood consequences are more common in low income families and among certain racial/ethnic minority groups in the United States (Slopen et al., 2016) Enduring barriers to social and economic opportunity on the basis of race may drive these disparities by increasing the likelihood of family circumstances that produce adverse childhood consequences.

Priority Three: Transportation

The Colleton County Economic Alliance states that Colleton County's strategic position to the prime business and commerce capitals of the Southeastern United States provides advantages to businesses and our citizens' way of life. (Colleton County Economic Alliance, 2022)

Palmetto Breeze Transit is the only form of public transportation for Colleton County residents. For those who are eligible, the transit provides services within 3/4-mile radius from a Walterboro Works fixed routes. The stops on this route are Apartment complexes, Walmart, Adult Education Learning Center, Colleton Career Skills Center, etc... Young children are not allowed to be transported on this transit system. In order to use this transit, adults must meet certain qualifications. Colleton County has limited taxi service as well as Uber and Lyft.

There is very little data on transportation in Colleton County since the options are so limited.
