Our partnership's work, in collaboration with state and local partners, is focused on advancing Anderson County towards these strategic goals in support of the Profile of the Ready Kindergartner, South Carolina's description of school readiness:

- Serve as a local portal for connecting atrisk families of Anderson County preschool children to services designed to strengthen families and promote optimal child development utilizing a twogenerational approach.
- Increase enrollment and expand accessibility in all Anderson County school districts utilizing the partnership's integrated community approach.
- Increase understanding in the community of school readiness and make information easily accessible for all Anderson County families through implementation of the partnership's Community Education and Outreach Plan.
- Serve as a community convener to address the needs of all Anderson County preschool children in support of state readiness priorities and mobilize communities to provide enhanced services to support all Anderson County families.

MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

During the past nineteen years, the Anderson County First Steps Partnership has distributed **\$12,289,900** to area providers to support parent and family strengthening programs and services, school transition programs and 4-K classes for at-risk children. **During 2018-19, the Partnership provided:**

- 214 children and 272 adults with family strengthening skills through Family Literacy programs linked to Positive Parenting, Early Education for Children under 4, Early Education Half-day 4-K classes, and Nurse-Family Partnership.
- 52 children and 50 parents with school transition to 5-K kindergarten assisted by 14 teacher/home visitors through the Countdown to Kindergarten program.
- 1005 books for 122 children through Family Literacy with Positive Parenting, Early Education, and Countdown to Kindergarten programs.
- a total of 266 children and 643 families with high-quality programs, resources, and community education and outreach activities.

In addition, I want to congratulate Anderson School District Four Family Literacy Program led by Charity Walker which received the 2018 SCDE Office of Adult Education Family Literacy Service Award given to a family literacy program who has continually championed family literacy and gone above and beyond to ensure that students participate in a quality family literacy program.

NURSE-FAMILY PARTNERSHIP

Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP) helps transform the lives of vulnerable first-time mothers and their babies. Through ongoing home visits from registered nurses, moms receive the care and support they need to have a healthy pregnancy, provide responsible and competent care for their children, and become more economically self-sufficient. From pregnancy until the child turns two years old, Nurse-Family Partnership Nurse Home Visitors form a much-needed, trusting relationship with their clients, instilling confidence and empowering them to achieve a better life for their children – and themselves.

COUNTDOWN TO KINDERGARTEN

an evidence-informed program

Developed by South Carolina First Steps – and identified as a promising state practice by the National Governor's Association in 2005 – Countdown to Kindergarten (CTK) is a home visitation program pairing the families of rising kindergartners with their future teachers during the summer before school entry. Teachers complete six visits with each family, establishing strong connections during the summer that facilitate classroom learning throughout the year.



EARLY EDUCATION PROGRAM: 4K CLASSES

THE **ANDERSON SCHOOL DISTRICT ONE** provides eligible children with highquality early education opportunities through two 4K half-day classes. The goals of the 4-K program are to increase the number of at-risk children served and prepare them for school readiness. The classes are located at Spearman Elementary School.

ELIGIBILITY

To qualify for enrollment, a child must:

Be 4 years old on or before September 1

- Qualify for Medicaid or a free or reduced-price lunch program
- Live in one of 64 qualifying school districts

In fiscal year 2019-2020, South Carolina First Steps is launching a pilot program to expand 4K enrollment within underserved communities. Age- and income-eligible children residing in any SC school district may qualify for a slot in a participating center that also serves students from eligible districts.

Anderson School District One by Liz Wittebort

This past school year, 8 teen moms and 1 Adult Education mother were served in the Family Literacy program. One particular teen mom showed the most amount of progress in a short amount of time. When I first met her, she had just broken up with her boyfriend with whom she shared a one-year-old child. She was heartbroken and at a loss of how to proceed in her life. She had envisioned graduating from high school and living with her boyfriend to create a true family for her little girl. We were able to work through this loss together and work on a new future plan. After Christmas break, she did not return to school and I was worried that she decided to drop out. However, we found out that her brother who she relied on for child care had gotten a new job and returned to work. With the support from First Steps, we were able to assist her with child care so she could return to school. Her school counselor was able to enroll her in the Fast Lane program to expedite her progress. With all of this support, she was able to finish her classes within three weeks! She was then able to apply for a job at the daycare where her child was now attending. She has been able to use her daycare experience to learn more about child development and the growth of her own child. In May, I was privileged to get the opportunity to watch her walk the stage and receive her high school diploma! Since graduation she has been working two part-time jobs to help pay for college expenses. She has been accepted at Greenville Tech. where she plans to study to become a legal assistant. I have been honored to be one of the few people in her life to watch her transform from a timid and shy girl to a confident and fearless young woman and know that the best is yet to come!

Anderson School District Two by Allison Strickland

CW successfully completed the 12th grade. C attended family literacy meetings and has a lot of family support and has worked really hard to graduate this year. She plans to continue working right now but hopes to attend a technical college in the near future

Anderson School District Three by Susan Brown

During the 2018-2019 program year, Anderson School District Three increased the Raising a Reader program by 40 families. The families showed a significant increase in the number of books in the home, the number of minutes spent reading together with their child, and the number of interaction with child and books. Through the expansion of the program, we were able to serve 2 Head Start 3-year-old classes and 2 classes of 4-year-olds at Flat Rock Elementary School. The staff spent numerous hours promoting Palmetto Basics and distributed 5,702 pieces of Palmetto Basics material.



Anderson School District Four by Charity Walker

A.M. returned to the Family Learning Center in August of this year. She met her goal of earning an EFL Gain on her Reading TABE test. She took two GED Ready tests this year and earned passing scores on both. A.M. has two children under three and has recently signed up for WIC. She also continued meeting with her nurse from Nurse Family Partnership until graduating from the program when her daughter turned two. A.M. has reported planning to return to classes next fall.

Anderson School District Five by Priscilla Williams

All of our students are success stories, but one in particular stands out. Grandmother came to our Grandparents Breakfast. She was so pleased with everything that she had to tell me how she felt. She said her daughter and grandson's father ask her and her husband for nothing. The teen parents do all of the care and provides for their child. She is so proud of how responsible they are. I had many opportunities to talk with this young mom. She is strong and refuses to let negative attitudes pull her down. She told me many had said she would not make it, but that makes her more determined. Her plans are to attend college in Florida and be able to rent a place for her family. It is important that they stay together. Her son's father shares her dream and encourages her. With this frame of mind, there is no doubt they will succeed.





an evidence-informed program

The Anderson County First Steps Partnership Community Education and Outreach Plan is composed of six components:1) distribute education materials to reflect partnership's mission and to inform the public of available resources; 2) co-sponsor community events that reach our target audience; 3) keep partnership website up-to-date; 4) use social media effectively to communicate, inform and activate; 5) educate and engage local and state policymakers on local impact of First Steps; and 6) network, coordinate, educate, convene parents, local community educational agencies, early childhood professionals, local leaders and the private sector about the importance of early childhood education and school readiness. The Partnership served as a sponsor with other community partners of the Partners for Prevention of Child Abuse community to raise awareness of

child abuse.


