OUR GOALS

Our partnership's work, in collaboration with state and local partners, is focused on advancing Marion County towards these strategic goals in support of the Profile of the Ready Kindergartner, South Carolina's description of school readiness:

- Increase Literacy Program to serve 150 children by one additional coordinator in the faith-based and Head Start communities by 2020.
- Increase the number of certified trainers in Marion County by 10%.
- Increase scholarships to 30 and serve children in hard to reach rural areas of Marion County by 2020.
- Host Community Meeting concerning Early Education

MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

As Fiscal Year 2019-2020 (FY19) school year begins, we reflect on our 20th Year Anniversary, and the tremendous work accomplished by the children, parents, and all our educational partners throughout First Steps existence. We have so much to be proud of since the inception of Marion County First Steps. As a community, we have raised over \$776, 702 to match our total state allocation of \$4,683,277. That's .17 per state dollar provided for evidence-based programs implemented in Marion County.

Last year, we saw the continued success of our Literacy Initiative, Child Care Quality Enhancement, Child Care Training, as well as Child Care Scholarship program. Marion County First Steps was able to:

- Serve 932 children between the ages of 0 and 5 years.
- Provided 16 parenting meeting and 54 parents attended.
- Read to approximately 700 children and distributed 9,020 books to 3 and 4-year-old.
- Served 18 children and 7 facilities received ABC Vouchers.
- Provide training to 62 Early Childhood staff from 17 programs.
- Provide 56.5 hours of technical assistance to 34 childcare providers from 3 childcare facilities.

Our success was due, in part, to our partnerships with Marion County childcare providers, Marion County School District, SC DSS, and our local and state Early Care and Education alliances. Although Marion County First Steps funds are limited, every dollar is allocated to our ultimate goal of assisting our youngest citizens in becoming successful learners as they enter school.

We want to ensure that Marion County children have access to the highest quality childcare programs that employ highly trained and knowledgeable staff. MCFS has provided our childcare center providers with opportunities for training throughout the year that ensures the quality of teaching is at the most optimal level for all young learners. Finally, by providing ABC Childcare Vouchers, we make it affordable for parents to send their child to a high quality childcare of their choice while they are working and/or attend school.

CHILD CARE TRAINING



High-quality child care hinges on high-quality professional development that meets the needs of the local child care workforce. CHILD CARE SCHOLARSHIPS



For many families in Marion County, the cost of quality child care is out of reach. Our scholarship program makes payments to child care providers to care for children from low-income families with a minimal of two risk factors so their parents can return to school or work.

Marion County First Steps successfully provided wrap-around services with Quality Enhancement (QE), Childcare Trainings and Scholarships. Scholarships were given directly to childcare facilities that participated in QE and income-eligible children with a minimal of two risk factors whose parent attends school or works at least 20 hours per week eligible to apply..

Raising A Reader (RAR) is a proven and evidence-based family engagement and early literacy program for children ages 0-8. The program helps families develop, practice, and maintain the home-based literacy routines necessary for school success. The goal or RAR is to substantially increase the number of families that share picture books and stories with their children frequently and routinely each week.






FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS
