First Steps celebrates 20 years of service in the communities we represent in 2019. This is significant for York County First Steps in a number of ways as we wrap up 2019 and look toward 2020.

- We made a significant step in 2019 to expand our Nurse-Family Partnership Program with the addition of two Home Visitation Nurses. This program is foundational in our efforts to reach our at risk families as early as possible in the development of the child.
- We continue to work with our Child Care Partners and School Districts to profile all the 4K options available in York County. We plan to develop a Parent Guide to help parents of rising 4K children in determining the best option for their family.
- We continue to elevate the technical support and training options for our Child Care Partners. Child Care Providers are an integral part of our early childhood educational system as more children experience their first classroom setting in a child care center.

We sincerely appreciate the collaboration of our partners and sister organizations as we look forward to their continued support in serving the families of York County.

NURSE-FAMILY PARTNERSHIP

an evidence-based program

Nurse-Family Partnership (NFP) helps transform the lives of vulnerable first-time mothers and their babies. Through ongoing home visits from registered nurses, moms receive the care and support they need to have a healthy pregnancy, provide responsible and competent care for their children, and become more economically self-sufficient. From pregnancy until the child turns two years old, Nurse-Family Partnership Nurse Home Visitors form a much-needed, trusting relationship with their clients, instilling confidence and empowering them to achieve a better life for their children – and themselves.

Parents as Teachers (PAT) is a home visiting program designed to build strong communities, thriving families and children who are healthy, safe and ready to succeed. PAT services include:



Personal visits from a parent educator at least twice monthly



Monthly group connections with other PAT families



an evidence-based program

Screenings and assessments to identify developmental concerns



Connections to outside resources that families may need to succeed



PAT recently received the highest rating from the federal Prevention Services Clearinghouse. This recognition validates the effectiveness of Parents as Teachers as a strategy for improving parenting practices, promoting early detection of developmental delays and health issues, preventing child abuse and neglect, and enhancing school readiness and success.

COUNTDOWN TO KINDERGARTEN

an evidence-informed program

Developed by South Carolina First Steps – and identified as a promising state practice by the National Governor's Association in 2005 – Countdown to Kindergarten (CTK) is a home visitation program pairing the families of rising kindergartners with their future teachers during the summer before school entry. Teachers complete six visits with each family, establishing strong connections during the summer that facilitate classroom learning throughout the year.

CHILD CARE QUALITY ENHANCEMENT



Many private child care centers strive to provide high quality care but lack the resources often available to publicly-funded early childhood programs. Our Child Care Quality Enhancement (QE) program aims to produce measurable improvements in the quality of care provided to young children. Our services include:



Rigorous quality assessments



On-site technical assistance at least twice monthly



Funding for equipment and materials



Training and workforce development



Coordination with community partners

There are roughly 150 child care centers in York County of various shapes and sizes, all trying to help preschool children prepare for success when they enter school. The childcare professionals who serve our children each day want to provide the most nurturing and educationally stimulating environment possible. York County First Steps helps elevate the quality, training, and resources available at the centers we serve so our children can thrive.



High-quality child care hinges on high-quality professional development that meets the needs of the local child care workforce. Our training programs are certified though the SC Center for Child Care Career Development and include topics in the areas of nutrition, health and safety, curriculum, child guidance, professional development and program administration. York County First Steps hosts an Annual Early Childhood Conference for child care professionals. We provide a dual track of sessions offering classroom skills and resources as well as updates on the latest early childhood topics such as Adverse Childhood Experiences and the impact of poverty on early brain development. Our key goal is to help celebrate the choice our participants have made to serve young children in their educational journey and help them renew their passion that learning with young children can be fun and exciting.



CHILD CARE SCHOLARSHIPS

an evidence-based program

Our Child Care Scholarships are dedicated to assist teenage mothers that are still in school working to complete their high school diploma. There are several risk factors present for the unborn child: teenage mother, parent without a high school degree, and in many cases, poor job prospects leading to poverty. By combining either Parents as Teachers or Nurse Family Partnership, both of which are evidenced based programs, we are able to help the teen mother strike the balance between being a new mother and being a successful student. The completion of their degree removes one of the risk factors for their child and helps provide a foundation for positive job prospects. We provide child care scholarships for the teenage mothers to a high quality child care setting as they continue to attend their school classes. We have been able to either graduate or retain our families at a rate of 80% or greater since the inception of the program.

100% the money paid to child care providers goes back into our local economy to benefit the citizens of York County. Our child care providers help extend our reach by providing discounts to YCFS and each mother pays a small percentage as part of their commitment to the program.



South Carolina First Steps provides eligible children with free enrollment in full-day four-year-old kindergarten programs. In coordination with First Steps local partnerships and more than 200 private, faith- and community-based preschool providers, First Steps 4K expands access to quality child care across the state.

In fiscal year 2019-2020, South Carolina First Steps is launching a pilot program to expand 4K enrollment within underserved communities. Ageand income-eligible children residing in any SC school district may qualify for a slot in a participating center that also serves students from eligible districts.
