Ms. Julie Hussey called the meeting to order at 2:07 p.m.

The meeting opened with the opportunity for public comment. No members of the public who were present wished to speak.

Ms. Hussey noted that a quorum was not present at that time and progressed the meeting to information only items.

The Executive Committee did not have a report for this meeting.

Ms. Hussey thanked the Local Partnership Executive Directors for their attendance at the meeting. She also recognized Ms. Marcia Bacon, Executive Director of Richland County First Steps, and the Virginia Wingard Memorial United Methodist Church for their work in providing the space for the SC First Steps Board of Trustees and Early Childhood Advisory Council.

Ms. Hussey noted that her board term, along with that of Mr. Walt Fleming, was coming to an end. Ms. Hussey stated that Ms. Georgia Mjartan was currently working on replacing her and Mr. Fleming while also filing other vacancies on the SC First Steps Board of Trustees and Early Childhood Advisory Council.

Ms. Mjartan then recognized Ms. Hussey for her nine years of service as a board member. It is noted that Mr. Fleming was not in attendance but will be recognized for his service at a later date.

Ms. Mjartan then introduced Dr. Rob Grunewald, an Economist with the Federal Reserve Bank of Minneapolis by trade, and a keynote speaker for the 2019 SC Summit on Early Childhood. Dr. Grunewald addressed the group about his research on how early care and education is directly related to economic development.

Several board members asked Dr. Grunewald questions.

Ms. Jennifer McConnell presented the report for the Program and Grants Committee.

Ms. McConnell stated that eleven local partnerships are working on their Corrective Action Plans and also noted the partnerships' carry-forward totals and percentages from FY19. Ms. McConnel said the committee discussed challenges facing the local partnerships including recruiting board members.

Ms. McConnell reminded the board of the Five-Year External Evaluation Report and noted that many of the report's findings and recommendations will be used by the Local Partnership team to guide their work with the local partnerships around board functioning and collaboration.

Ms. McConnell gave an update on the grant opportunity offered to local partnerships for collaboration with First Steps 4K providers. The grants will be used to improve family engagement and early literacy using the evidence-based program, Raising a Reader, and Ready Rosie.

Ms. McConnell announced the grant recipients: Barnwell, Chester, Chesterfield, Colleton, Florence, Kershaw, Lee, Marion and Williamsburg.

Ms. McConnell completed her presentation by directing the group to the document in their packet labeled FY20 Reallocation of Budgets 15% and Greater. Ms. McConnell indicated that Anderson County First Steps will reallocate funds to four Anderson County School Districts and the Nurse-Family Partnership. This reallocation does not require a board vote.



Mr. Tim Holt presented the report for the Finance and Administration Committee. Mr. Holt stated that the committee did not have any action items and noted that all financial reports are in great shape. Mr. Holt said the new financial management systems, Blackbaud, is in the implementation stage.

Dr. Amy Williams gave the report for the Strategic Planning and Evaluation Committee. Dr. Williams recognized Ms. Chelsea Richard as the new staff liaison for the committee.

Dr. Williams said the committee did not have any action items and provided updates regarding the strategic plan. She noted that the committee would bring a draft strategic plan with definitions for the agency's values to the next meeting in February.

Ms. Mjartan called the board's attention to the Executive Summary of the External Evaluation of South Carolina First Steps. Dr. Williams asked the board to use the executive summary to help spread the word in their communities of the great work happening at the state and local level.

Ms. Hussey recognized Mr. Micah Rea (Lt. Governor's Office), Mr. Pierce McNair (Rep. Rita Allison's office) and Ms. Amber Gillum (SC Department of Social Services) for their attendance.

Ms. Mjartan presented the 2018-2019 Annual Report and gave the 2019 Year in Review as her Executive Director's Report.

Ms. Mjartan recognized new employees, Ms. Valencia Johnson, Mr. Doug Brooks, and Mr. Micah Ely.

Ms. Mjartan thanked board members for their giving in 2019 and noted that as of that day, the board have given approximately \$6,000.

Ms. Mjartan mentioned that she and her staff will be exploring an AmeriCorps grant funded by the United Way Association which would have a focus on school readiness, community outreach and parent engagement.

Ms. Hussey noted that a quorum was present.

Dr. Williams made a motion to approve the October 24, 2019 minutes as written. Ms. Angel Johnson-Brebner provided a second and the motion was unanimously approved.

The meeting was adjourned by Ms. Hussey at 3:12 p.m.

Executive Committee

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of South Carolina First Steps met on February 10-2020 at 10 am. At the meeting, a variety of matters were discussed, as outlined in the attached minutes.

There was discussion about Board Leadership and transitions. Specifically, both Julie Hussey and Walt Fleming are serving in expired terms, having completed two full terms, and we anticipate the appointment of new members for these seats. The Executive Committee discussed candidates to serve as Vice Chair of SC First Steps and the Early Childhood Advisory Council and agreed that Dr. Shelley Canright would be an ideal Vice Chair. As per the agency's bylaws, "From among the Directors, the Chairman shall appoint a Vice Chairman of the Board who shall perform the duties of the Chairman in the Chairman's absence.

The Executive Committee voted favorably on two items, one of which will be considered in the First Steps Board of Trustees meeting and the other for consideration in the Early Childhood Advisory Council meeting. These two motions are below.

Motion: To change the name of the Program and Grants Committee to "Local Partnership Program and Grants Committee" and to clarify that the purpose of the committee is to provide programmatic and grant oversight and accountability to local partnerships and to offer support and make recommendations to the local partnership team at SC First Steps. (Motion by Jennifer McConnell, second by Julie Hussey, unanimous approval.)

Motion: To affirm that the SC Early Childhood Advisory Council will take ownership and responsibility for the development and maintenance of First Five SC, South Carolina's portal into publicly-funded early childhood programs and services, ensuring data integrity and privacy. (Motion by David Morley, second by Julie Hussey, unanimous approval.)

Executive Committee Meeting Minutes

February 10, 2020 Present: David Morley, Julie Hussey, Jennifer McConnell, Walt Fleming, Amy Williams Absent: Sen. Gerald Malloy

The Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees of South Carolina First Steps met by phone on February 10-2020 at 10 am. At the meeting, a variety of matters were discussed including: prospective board members submitted to Senate President Harvey Peeler and Governor Henry McMaster for consideration to fill vacant or expired board seats, committees, board giving, and an upcoming learning opportunity for board members – the Together SC Summit focused on racial equity. Board giving for 2019 totaled \$8025, donated by eleven members plus our Executive Director. We had 53% board giving. We will continue to strive for 100% giving in 2020.

In discussing committees, the members agreed that clarifying the name and purpose of the Program and Grants Committee would be beneficial. The following motion was made by Jennifer McConnell, seconded by Julie Hussey, and passed unanimously:

Motion: To change the name of the Program and Grants Committee to "Local Partnership Program and Grants Committee" and to clarify that the purpose of the committee is to provide programmatic and grant oversight and accountability to local partnerships and to offer support and make recommendations to the local partnership team at SC First Steps.

The committee discussed potential candidates for the role of Vice Chair of the Board of Trustees of South Carolina First Steps and the Early Childhood Advisory Council. All agreed that Dr. Shelley Canright would be an ideal candidate to serve in this role. Mr. Morley will discuss with her and plan to make a decision about who he will appointment to this position ahead of the February 20th board meeting.

Other matters discussed included updates on the Early Childhood Advisory Council's work and next steps for Palmetto PreK, First Five SC, and the development of a statewide Early Childhood Strategic Plan for review and adoption by the Early Childhood Advisory Council. Ms. Mjartan explained that the work of the year one First Five SC committee was to develop a unified vision and specs for a single portal into all publicly-funded early childhood programs and services. The committee has completed that work, and the Preschool Development Grant year one funding will conclude on February 29, 2020. The committee discussed the role of the Early Childhood Advisory Council in ensuring the development and completion of the South Carolina Early Childhood Plan for adoption by the ECAC, and continued development, execution, maintenance and promotion of First Five SC and Palmetto PreK. From this discussion, the following motion was made by Mr. David Morley, seconded by Julie Hussey, and passed unanimously:

Motion: To affirm that the SC Early Childhood Advisory Council will take ownership and responsibility for the development and maintenance of First Five SC, South Carolina's portal into publicly-funded early childhood programs and services, ensuring data integrity and privacy.

Executive Director Georgia Mjartan provided an update on legislative matters including statewide expansion of 4K and budget requests including local partnership funding. Ms. Mjartan also provided information on the development of a conflict of interest policy for local partnerships and the process that will be used to monitor these conflicts of interest. Mr. Fleming noted that the Finance and Administration Committee had also reviewed the proposed conflict of interest policy. Mr. Fleming also reminded the



committee that the new formula funding allocation model continues to be phased in this year. Ms. Mjartan provided updates on the grant-making process and current, active grant opportunities and also offered information on the agency's grant-seeking efforts including an outline of grants pending and in development.

Ms. Mjartan gave a brief update on personnel matters, noting vacancies and highlighting the needs for a dedicated HR Manager in addition to the Executive Assistant.

- Why Do Child Care Centers Matter for our Economy?



Child care centers are ready for a statewide expansion of 4K.

There is a great need in South Carolina to serve more four year olds.

In the Palmetto State, we estimate that there are over 58,000 four year olds, and about 36,000 (62.1%) of them are considered at-risk. Approximately 4 out of 10 at-risk four year olds in our state live in a non-CERDEP school district.

Child care centers can meet that need today.

Statewide, there are 186,876 slots in 1,654 licensed, approved, or registered child care centers. In the non-CERDEP school districts, there are 84,516 slots (45.2%).

First Steps 4K provides high quality education to children and support to centers.

Currently, 216 (13.1%) child care centers have at least one First Steps 4K classroom. If every center in the state had one classroom of 20 First Steps 4K students, 33,080 children could be served. If every center in non-CERDEP school districts had one First Steps 4K classroom, 11,880 children could be served. This would serve approximately 8 out of 10 at-risk four year olds in those districts.






First Steps 4K is high quality.

There are 182 (84.3%) child care centers with at least one First Steps 4K classroom that participate in the ABC Quality Rating System, compared to 32.9% (473/1438) of centers without a First Steps 4K classroom. Among centers with a First Steps 4K classroom that participate in ABC Quality, 68.7% (125/182) of them are rated B or higher, compared to 56.7% (268/473) of centers without a First Steps 4K classroom.



South Carolina's Profile of the Ready Kindergartner

What does it mean to be READY FOR SCHOOL?

All children are ready for kindergarten when they are five years old by September 1 of that school year. But kindergarten readiness is more than a matter of age. For a strong start in school, children need positive relationships and supportive learning environments beginning at birth. It is our responsibility as families, caregivers and communities to nurture the health and development necessary for school success.

South Carolina's Profile of the Ready Kindergartner describes the physical, cognitive, social and emotional signs of school readiness. Because each child develops differently, each child will be ready in different ways. Schools and educators must be prepared to meet the individual needs of students at all levels of readiness, providing whatever support and services are needed for a quality kindergarten experience.

The Ready Five-Year-Old-THE READY KINDERGARTNER, with engaged support from his/her parents, caregivers and community, has developed the skills and abilities necessary for achievement to achieve at age-appropriate levels. He/she is physically, socially, & emotionally prepared to benefit from a quality kindergarten experience.

Approaches to Learning and Inquiry

- Demonstrates eagerness to learn-
- Shows curiosity through questioning-
- Shows creativity and imagination through pretend play-
- Engages in daily opportunities for play and exploration-
- Shows willingness to try new things-
- Persists in tasks that are challenging-
- Maintains attention-
- Applies learning to new situations.
- Solves problems with materials at hand.
- Use senses and observations to learn about the surrounding world around them.

Emotional and Social Development

- · Works and plays cooperatively Shares, takes turns and plays well with others-


