### The First 1,000 Days






- Early experiences influence the developing brain
- Toxic affects of chronic stress
- Adversity can lead to lifelong problems
- Early intervention can prevent consequences
- Stable, caring relationships essential for development

#### NFP Projected Outcomes





The following outcomes have been observed among participants in at least one of the trials of the program:

 $48\% \ \ {\rm reduction} \ {\rm in} \ {\rm child} \ {\rm abuse} \ {\rm and} \ {\rm neglect}$ 

**56%** reduction in ER visits for accidents and poisonings

**50%** reduction in language delays of child age 21 months

67% less behavioral/intellectual problems at age 6

 $\textbf{79\%} \ \ \text{reduction in preterm delivery for women who smoke}$ 

**32%** fewer subsequent pregnancies

**82%** increase in months employed



#### South Carolina NFP



- 2009: Launch 6 Network Partners (NPs), serving 600 Families
- 2010-2011: MIECHV Expansion (Growth in Existing NPs, plus 1 new NP)
- 2012-2013: MIECHV + Private Expansion (2 NPs)
- 2016: Private Expansion (1 NP) + SC Pay for Success Project
- 10 NPs, 77 Nurse Home Visitors, 2,400 Families served annually





## York Regional NFP



- First Steps partnership is the Implementing Agency and launched with 2 Home Visitation Nurses in September 2016.
- Relies on an independent blended funding stream of State funds and grants from local, state, national, and federal sources.
- Expanded service capacity in 2018, 2019 and 2020, with an open position available.
- NFP is viewed as a foundational intervention that integrates extremely well with other partners and programs.
