Berkeley County First Steps was founded on the belief that all young children deserve the right to quality health, early education and care. We were founded on the belief that all caregivers deserve the education and supports to help children reach Kindergarten safely and equipped with the tools needed to be successful in school and beyond. We were founded on the expectation that our local boards and child serving agencies have power, and that we can make a difference in the lives of children and caregivers in our communities when we *dare to use that power*.

GETTING CHILDREN READY FOR SCHOOL

All children are ready to benefit from a quality kindergarten experience when they are five years old by September 1 of that school year. But kindergarten readiness—the critical stage at which children are prepared for learning and success—is more than a matter of age. For a strong start in school, children need positive relationships and supportive learning environments beginning at birth. At First Steps, we partner with families, caregivers, and communities to ensure that all children are prepared for success.



OUR GOALS

South Carolina's Profile of the Ready Kindergartner

Developed by SC First Steps and the SC Department of Education, the state's description of school readiness includes 60 developmental milestones across 5 categories:



Approaches to learning & inquiry



Emotional & social development



Physical development, self-help & motor skills



Mathematical thinking



Language & literacy development

In support of the Profile of the Ready Kindergartner, our approach is focused on advancing Berkeley County toward the following strategic goals:

- Goal 1 Ensure that our county is a community that is educated on the value of early childhood development and care and parent engagement.
- Goal 2 Ensure that the hardest-to reach families have equitable opportunities for healthy early childhood development experiences and activities.
- Goal 3 Increase financial investments, expand professional development and workforces supports to current early childhood programs through quality enhancement and professional development initiatives that represent best practices and honor cultural diversity.

PIVOTING FOR COVID-19

When the coronavirus pandemic forced South Carolina to shut down in March 2020, Berkeley County First Steps quickly pivoted to provide much-needed support to young children, their families and child care providers.

Our work has never been more critical. While children are at low risk for the serious health effects of the virus, the crisis is having a profound impact on their wellbeing and development. For children of color and low-income communities, these impacts are expected to be even more damaging. That is why Berkeley County First Steps is enhancing our efforts to provide parents and caregivers with the services and resources they need to weather this storm.

Berkeley County First Steps was able to create an emergency relief fund through private donations, and grants from the Trident United Way, and Sisters of Charity SC,. Over 140 families have received help with diapers, formula, groceries, and personal & household items. We were also able to provide utility and rent assistance to 10 families.

Berkeley County First Steps continues to mobilize our partners to aid in addressing our families most basic needs., and has successfully connected many parents with other community resources.





EARLY IDENTIFICATION & REFERRAL



First Steps' Early Identification and Referral (EI&R) programs serve families with young children with suspected delays in development, acting as a local portal to connect families to community-based services they may need or desire to ensure the school readiness of their children. EI&R services include:



Screenings for children ages 0-5 with suspected delays in development



Referrals, based on screening results, to appropriate resources and support services



Patient information including strategies to monitor growth and development

Parents as Teachers (PAT) is a home visiting program designed to build strong communities, thriving families and children who are healthy, safe and ready to succeed. PAT services include:



Personal visits from a parent educator at least twice monthly



Monthly group connections with other PAT families



Screenings and assessments to identify developmental concerns



Connections to outside resources that families may need to succeed

PAT GOES VIRTUAL

Due to COVID-19, Parents as Teachers (PAT) National provided guidance for affiliates to deliver virtual services via interactive video conferencing and phone calls. South Carolina PAT affiliates rose to the occasion by engaging families in creative and meaningful ways while continuing to meet the Essential Requirements of implementing a quality PAT program during the pandemic.

Based on our parenting, literacy, and developmental screenings, we were able to make approximately 488 connections to community resources for our families and obtained additional interventions for many of our children.





COUNTDOWN TO KINDERGARTEN



Developed by South Carolina First Steps – and identified as a promising state practice by the National Governor's Association in 2005 – Countdown to Kindergarten (CTK) is a home visitation program pairing the families of rising kindergartners with their future teachers during the summer before school entry. Teachers complete six visits with each family, establishing strong connections during the summer that facilitate classroom learning throughout the year.

Many private child care centers strive to provide high quality care but lack the resources often available to publicly-funded early childhood programs. Our Child Care Quality Enhancement (QE) program aims to produce measurable improvements in the quality of care provided to young children.

CHILD CARE SCHOLARSHIPS



For many families in Berkeley County, the cost of quality childcare is out of reach. Our scholarship program makes payments to childcare providers to care for children from low-income families so their parents can return to school or work.

Berkeley County First Steps offers scholarships to families enrolled in our Parents As

Teachers program, or the Nurse-Family Partnership program. To be eligible for a voucher,

parents must meet income eligibility guidelines, and be working, or in school.

FOUR-YEAR-OLD KINDERGARTEN



South Carolina First Steps provides eligible children with free enrollment in full-day four-year-old kindergarten. In coordination with First Steps local partnerships and more than 230 private, community and faith-based preschool providers, First Steps 4K expands access to quality early education across the state.



ELIGIBILITY

To qualify for enrollment, a child must be:



4 years old on or before September 1



Eligible for Medicaid, SNAP or TANF, experiencing homelessness or transiency, or in foster care

The Berkeley Early Education and Care Collective (BEE Collective) is a community-based network that was formed by Berkeley First Steps to build an integrated mental health framework to improve the social-emotional development outcomes of children, prenatal to 6. The mission of the BEE Collective is to ensure that every child enters kindergarten socially and emotionally ready to learn, that every educator has positive well-being and the tools to handle challenging behaviors, that families are resilient and that our community reduces mental health stigma for all ages. Our vision is to build upon the assets of our hardest to reach children, parents and educators so that we can co-create beloved community in early education where everyone is treated with dignity. The BEE Collective uses a collective impact approach and builds on previous work and best practices that coalition partners and direct services providers have found successful to achieving community change.




