MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

It is an honor to present to you this report, which captures the work the Clarendon County First Steps Partnership Board and our partners have done to promote school readiness in Clarendon County during the 2019-2020 program year. The programs and services we have chosen to implement are supported by research on "what works" in getting children ready for school.

Research consistently tells us the following:

- High-quality early childhood education has the potential to reduce attendees' timidity and improves attentiveness;
- Child care quality has a long-term effect on children's cognitive and socioemotional development through kindergarten and beyond;
- High-quality early learning programs can close the achievement gap;
- Early learning and care has the potential to increase high school graduation rates.;
- Early language skills, the foundation for reading ability and school readiness, are acquired and built during the first five years of life. Children who are exposed to reading during the first years of life are much more likely to learn to read on schedule; and
- Children who enter kindergarten behind their peers academically are more likely to stay or fall behind.

Taking into account the research available on school readiness, the Clarendon County First Steps Partnership Board has consistently worked and will continue to work in collaboration with our partners to ensure that we implement programs and services that will help us in our efforts to prepare our children for school. The information contained herein is the product of our collective efforts during the 2019-2020 program year.

GETTING CHILDREN READY FOR SCHOOL

All children are ready to benefit from a quality kindergarten experience when they are five years old by September 1 of that school year. But kindergarten readiness—the critical stage at which children are prepared for learning and success—is more than a matter of age. For a strong start in school, children need positive relationships and supportive learning environments beginning at birth. At First Steps, we partner with families, caregivers, and communities to ensure that all children are prepared for success.



South Carolina's Profile of the Ready Kindergartner

Developed by SC First Steps and the SC Department of Education, the state's description of school readiness includes 60 developmental milestones across 5 categories:



Approaches to learning & inquiry



Emotional & social development



Physical development, self-help & motor skills



Mathematical thinking



Language & literacy development

OUR GOALS

In support of the Profile of the Ready Kindergartner, our approach is focused on advancing Clarendon County toward the following strategic goals:

- Goal 1: To help Clarendon County's citizens understand what school readiness;
- Goal 2: To partner with others within the community to promote school readiness;
- Goal 3: To equip parents and early care and education providers with the knowledge and tools they need in order to successfully prepare Clarendon County's preschool children for school.

PIVOTING FOR COVID-19

When the coronavirus pandemic forced South Carolina to shut down in March 2020, Clarendon County First Steps quickly pivoted to provide much-needed support to young children, their families and child care providers.

Our work has never been more critical. While children are at low risk for the serious health effects of the virus, the crisis is having a profound impact on their wellbeing and development. For children of color and low-income communities, these impacts are expected to be even more damaging. That is why Clarendon County First Steps is committed to enhancing our efforts to provide parents and caregivers with the services and resources they need to weather this storm.

Other partners in the COVID-19 Testing Clinic included Hope Health, Clarendon School District 1, Clarendon County Administration, Emergency Management and Sheriff's Department, Mayor of Summerton – Mac Bagnal, Mayor of Manning – Julia Nelson, SC Army National Guard, SC Air National Guard and SC Department of Transportation.





Parents as Teachers (PAT) is a home visiting program designed to build strong communities, thriving families and children who are healthy, safe and ready to succeed. PAT services include:



Personal visits from a parent educator at least twice monthly



Monthly group connections with other PAT families



Screenings and assessments to identify developmental concerns



Connections to outside resources that families may need to succeed

PAT GOES VIRTUAL

Due to COVID-19, Parents as Teachers (PAT) National provided guidance for affiliates to deliver virtual services via interactive video conferencing and phone calls. South Carolina PAT affiliates rose to the occasion by engaging families in creative and meaningful ways while continuing to meet the Essential Requirements of implementing a quality PAT program during the pandemic.

IMAGINATION LIBRARY



As the local affiliate of Dolly Parton's Imagination Library, we provide free, high-quality books to children from birth until age five, no matter their family's income.

Children enrolled in our Imagination Library program receive one book per month by mail. Each title is selected by a panel of early childhood literacy experts, who are responsible for choosing books that meet the age-specific developmental needs of young children.

COUNTDOWN TO KINDERGARTEN



Developed by South Carolina First Steps – and identified as a promising state practice by the National Governor's Association in 2005 – Countdown to Kindergarten (CTK) is a home visitation program pairing the families of rising kindergartners with their future teachers during the summer before school entry. Teachers complete six visits with each family, establishing strong connections during the summer that facilitate classroom learning throughout the year.




