GETTING CHILDREN READY FOR SCHOOL

All children are ready to benefit from a quality kindergarten experience when they are five years old by September 1 of that school year. But kindergarten readiness—the critical stage at which children are prepared for learning and success—is more than a matter of age. For a strong start in school, children need positive relationships and supportive learning environments beginning at birth. At First Steps, we partner with families, caregivers, and communities to ensure that all children are prepared for success.

- **Goal 2:** Increase access to high quality, stable childcare environments.
- **Goal 3:** Increase knowledge and parenting skills necessary to promote school readiness.
- Goal 4: Improve literacy outcomes for children 0-5.

PIVOTING FOR COVID-19

When the coronavirus pandemic forced South Carolina to shut down in March 2020, Pickens County First Steps quickly pivoted to provide much-needed support to young children, their families and childcare providers.

Our work has never been more critical. While children are at low risk for the serious health effects of the virus, the crisis is having a profound impact on their well being and development. For children of color and low-income communities, these impacts are expected to be even more damaging. That is why Pickens County First Steps is enhancing our efforts to provide parents and caregivers with the services and resources they need to weather this storm.

Resources on Maximizing Love & Managing Stress (Palmetto Basic #1), as well as connecting families to vital social services, have been our focus during the Covid-19 crisis.

*The Center for American Progress defines a childcare desert as a ZIP code with at least 30 children under the age of 5 and either no child care centers or so few centers that there are more than three times as many children under age 5 as there are spaces in centers.

EARLY IDENTIFICATION & REFERRAL

First Steps' Early Identification and Referral (EI&R) programs serve families with young children with suspected delays in development, acting as a local portal to connect families to community-based services they may need or desire to ensure the school readiness of their children. EI&R services include:

Referrals, based on screening results, to appropriate resources and support services



Early detection of delay is essential to the growing brains of our county's youngest learners. Early intervention services can change the trajectory of a child's developmental path and improve outcomes for children, families and communities.



Parents as Teachers (PAT) is a home visiting program designed to build strong communities, thriving families and children who are healthy, safe and ready to succeed. PAT services include:



Personal visits from a parent educator at least twice monthly



Monthly group connections with other PAT families

Screenings and assessments to identify developmental concerns



Connections to outside resources that families may need to succeed

PAT GOES VIRTUAL

Due to COVID-19, Parents as Teachers (PAT) National provided guidance for affiliates to deliver virtual services via interactive video conferencing and phone calls. South Carolina PAT affiliates rose to the occasion by engaging families in creative and meaningful ways while continuing to meet the Essential Requirements of implementing a quality PAT program during the pandemic.






COUNTDOWN TO KINDERGARTEN

an evidence-informed program

Developed by South Carolina First Steps – and identified as a promising state practice by the National Governor's Association in 2005 – Countdown to Kindergarten (CTK) is a home visitation program pairing the families of rising kindergartners with their future teachers during the summer before school entry. Teachers complete six visits with each family, establishing strong connections during the summer that facilitate classroom learning throughout the year.





Thanks to our state's Preschool Development Grant, we were able to offer Countdown to Kindergarten to six rising kindergartners from West End Elementary.

Pictured here is Ruthie Chapman, our home visitor, reading *Chicka Chicka Boom Boom* and doing school readiness activities with one of our children. Countdown emphasizes the importance of daily routines, such as, daily reading, counting, pointing and exploring.





Economic disparity is great in our county. In many homes this is due to the lack of resources to pay for childcare. Recent research tells us that this economic inequality is producing a generation of children who lack the exposure to meaningful early experiences necessary to later pursue the "American Dream."

Child Care Scholarships provide opportunities for vulnerable families to look for employment and/or seek education that will grant them the ability to provide better resources for their children, thus leading to self-sufficiency. Child Care Scholarships give participating children meaningful early experiences in a quality setting.

Our scholarships serve families with children that are most at risk for school failure. These at-risk families will also possess the desire to become financially stable but lack the resources to maintain employment and/or school attendance because of the financial barrier to quality childcare. Families served must be denied ABC vouchers and provide verification of employment or school attendance.

According to the Center on the Developing Child at Harvard University, the peak period for brain development related to language is around nine months of age. One of the easiest and most effective ways to build this capacity in young children's brains is to read to them.

Book Flood is a literacy model designed to enhance book exposure and increase shared reading time at home. It also develops, enhances, and increases literacy awareness skills in a home / school collaboration while fostering a love of reading. It is implemented in the public 4K classrooms in the School District of Pickens County as well as private childcare centers.

Age-appropriate books are distributed by rotation among 4K teachers/providers in the county. Students take home a different book each school night to read with a family member.

Raising A Reader is a nationally recognized early literacy program designed to increase literacy and family engagement. The program includes teacher training and two parent education sessions that teach shared reading techniques.

Children 2-4 years old in participating childcare scholarship centers receive a take-home bag with 4 age-appropriate books each week. The take-home bags are rotated among participating children.

Over the course of the year, our friends read over 48,387 books. That equates to an average of over 7,637 hours of reading!



RAZOR READERS

an evidence-informed program

Taking place in local barber shops, Razor Readers is a community-wide literacy program for boys 0-10 years old. We partner with United Way of Pickens County and the Call Me Mister program. The "Misters" offer on-site support to participating barbershops on Friday afternoons or Saturday mornings. Boys read books and earn a free haircut upon completion of their "punch card."

Relationships are a powerful vehicle for providing resources and programs to the children and communities that need them most. Razor Readers promotes literacy in a way that's fun, in a setting that's familiar, and with young men who are educational role models.

The Palmetto Basics are five fun, simple, powerful way to help all children become the happiest and most successful they can be. The Palmetto Basics Campaign is working to make sure that every parent and caregiver knows what they can do to make the most of every opportunity to give the youngest learners they love a great start in life!

The Five Basics are:

Maximize Love, Manage Stress
Talk, Sing, Point
Count, Group and Compare
Explore through Movement and Play
Read and Discuss Stories



We now have over 450 subscribers to our DoBasics text program. Parents and caregivers can sign up to receive free weekly parenting tips via text. Each text focuses on that month's Palmetto Basic theme.

When the Covid-19 crisis hit, we began using this service to ask families what their needs were and direct them to relevant resources and services. We are also using one text a month to highlight specific social services and resources, such as WIC.


