Research consistently tells us:

- School readiness matters because the early years of a child's life establish the foundation on which all future school success is built.
- Parents are a child's first teacher, and we need to equip them with the tools they need to be their child's first and best teacher.
- Children that are exposed to reading during the first years of life are much more likely to learn to read on schedule.
- Child care quality has a long-term effect on children's cognitive and social-emotional development through kindergarten and beyond.
- Children who enter kindergarten behind their peers academically are more likely to stay or fall behind.

Clarendon County First Steps' Board and I rely heavily upon research to determine what school readiness programs and services work and which ones we should use the funds allocated to us to implement. Your voices, coupled with the research on school readiness, go a long way in helping us to select and implement programs and services that will help us to help our youngest and most vulnerable citizens arrive at first grade healthy and ready to succeed. Overarching Measures of Success

Clarendon County First Steps will:

INCREASE THE REACH OF FIRST STEPS SERVICES

By 2023, the percentage of children in need who are directly served by CCFS will increase from 22% to 27%.

INCREASE THE NUMBER OF CHILDREN ENROLLED IN HIGH INTENSITY PROGRAMS FUNDED BY FIRST STEPS

By 2023, the percentage of children directly served by First Steps enrolled in high intensity programs will increase from 28% to 40%.

INCREASE THE AVAILABILITY OF HIGH-QUALITY EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION OPPORTUNITIES AVAILABLE IN CLARENDON COUNTY

By 2023, the percentage of children under age 6 who benefit from First Steps quality enhancement and training efforts will increase from 16% to 21%.

Objectives

Clarendon County First Steps will:

- 1. PARENTS ARE CONFIDENT AND CAPABLE IN THEIR ROLE AS THE FIRST AND MOST IMPORTANT TEACHERS OF THEIR CHILDREN.
- 2. PRESCHOOL CHILDREN HAVE LITERACY-RICH HOME ENVIRONMENTS.
- 3. CHILDREN SMOOTHLY ANS SEAMLESSLY TRANSITION FROM 4-K to 5-K.
- 4. CHILDREN ARE HEALTHY, SAFE, AND RECEIVE EARLY CARE AND EDUCATION THAT ENABLES THEM TO BE READY FOR SCHOOL.

SMART GOAL(S)

- Beginning in FY 2022, the number of families served in PAT will increase by 7% annually.
- Beginning in FY 2022, the number of prenatal families will increase by 5%.
- From FY 2021-2023, Clarendon County First Steps will continue to partner with parents and members of Clarendon County's early care and education, social services, and medical communities to deliver parent education and support services to families whose children can most benefit from PAT.

SMART GOAL(S)

 From FY 2021 to FY 2023, CCFS will continue to partner with individuals and organizations to provide one free, age-appropriate book every month to Clarendon County's children age birth to five. CCFS will partner to provide free books to at least 200 children annually.

Other Book Distributions

SMART GOAL(S)

- By the end of FY 2021, the number of Clarendon County's preschool children receiving free books through community events, etc. will increase by 20%.
- CCFS will established ongoing partnerships with Clarendon School Districts to distribute free books to at least 200 children from birth to 5 annually.

Communication Education and Awareness

SMART GOAL(S)

 CCFS will establish ongoing partnerships with Head Start, and School Districts, childcare providers, and parents to help children successfully transition from 4K to 5K.

STRATEGY 4.1

Child Care Training & Professional Development

SMART GOAL(S)

- From FY 2021 to FY 2023, CCFS will offer 15-20 hours of free certified training annually to Clarendon County's early care and education providers. Sessions will enable providers to:
 - Effectively advocate for programs and services they need in order to best serve the children in their care;
 - Understand school readiness and early childhood education;
 - Be familiar with curriculum, effective teaching styles, and school readiness expectations;
 - Provide a healthy and safe environment for the children they serve; and
 - Consistently implement best practices in working with preschool children and their families.
- Beginning in FY 2022, CCFS will survey providers to determine what post-training support they need in order to successfully implement strategies learned during training sessions.
- From FY 2022 to FY 2023, CCFS will provide ongoing technical assistance as requested by providers.
